THE PHILIP CHRISTOPH VOGLER MEMORIAL, INC. WAS FOUNDED BY CHARLES M. VOGLER, WITH THE FIRST STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING (SCM) BEING HELD ON JULY 27, 1986 AT WINSTON-SALEM, NC. IT WAS INCORPORATED ON AUGUST 1986, BY E. EDWARD VOGLER, JR. THE SECOND SCM WAS HELD ON OCTOBER 5, 1986. THE FIRST VOGLER REUNION WAS HELD ON APRIL 10-12, 1987 IN WINSTON-SALEM. THE NAME WAS CHANGED TO PHILIP CHRISTOPH VOGLER FOUNDATION, INC. IN JUNE 1994.

The new Board of the PCVF, installed in May, has come out of the gate running. The Board has asked the Trip Committee to organize our next family adventure. The trip will commence in July of 2005 and focus on the "Northern Connection" in our Family's North American history. See page three for a proposed outlined itinerary penned by Dr. Frederick W. 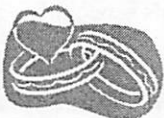

Proposed Itinerary For 2005 Vogler Family Canadian Trip

DAY 1 – PORTLAND

Group meets at Portland Airport (PWM) and boards chartered bus to proceed to hotel for check-in and lunch. Afternoon bus tour of city and nearby area, including Sebago Lake and Sabbathday Lake (historic Shaker community). Return to hotel for dinner and night.

DAY 2 – PORTLAND / ROCKLAND

After breakfast at hotel, board bus for brief follow-up sightseeing tour of Portland before proceeding northeast along I-95, with brief optional stop at Freeport (L. L. Bean headquarters and store), continuing to Augusta (state capital), with stop there for lunch. Bus then proceeds to Bangor and nearby Orono (Univ. of Maine and home of the Fogler Library, named in honor of our distinguished late cousin Raymond Fogler, who attended both our first and second reunions in 1987 and 1990). After stop there, bus continues south to Belfast, then along coastal highway to Camden, Rockport, and finally Rockland. Dinner and night at Samoset Resort, where our 1990 second reunion was held.

DAY 3 – ROCKLAND / BAR HARBOR

After breakfast at hotel, board bus and proceed west, with stop at “Montpelier” (Gen. Knox’s historic 18th-c. home and estate), continuing on to Thomaston, Friendship (picturesque small fishing port), and Waldoboro (originally named Broad Bay and our ancestors’ first American home from 1742 until their departure for North Carolina in 1770), stopping for sightseeing and lunch. After lunch and any additional sightseeing, bus proceeds southwest along the coast to So. Bristol and nearby Christmas Cove (discovered by Capt. John Smith on Christmas Day 1612), then returns to Waldoboro before continuing northeast to stop briefly at So. Hope (ancestral home of several Fogler cousins of ours). Bus then proceeds northeast to Bar Harbor on Mt. Desert Island for dinner and night at hotel.

DAY 4 – BAR HARBOR / HALIFAX, NS

After breakfast at hotel, board bus to proceed to high-speed car ferry (“The Cat”) for ocean voyage to Yarmouth, NS. After landing in NS, with lunch at Yarmouth, bus proceeds northeast along Atlantic coast highway, stopping briefly at Voglers Cove and Lunenburg, both longtime homes of Nova Scotia Vogler family members since the 18th Century, then continuing on to Halifax for dinner and night at hotel.

DAY 5 – HALIFAX / LOUISBOURG

After breakfast at hotel, board bus to continue drive northeast along Atlantic coast highway (stopping for lunch in area), reaching Glace Bay on northeast coast of Cape Breton Island (part of Nova Scotia), then turning south to nearby Louisbourg, also on Cape Breton Island coast. After a visit to the historic restored French Fortress of Louisbourg (scene of Philipp Christoph Vogler’s and Anna Catharina Seitz’s marriage in 1746 after its capture by New England volunteer soldiers supporting the British naval attack), dinner and night at hotel in area.

DAY 6 – LOUISBOURG / YARMOUTH

After breakfast at hotel and any additional sightseeing in that area, board bus to drive west across Cape Breton Island, then southwest to Port Hastings (Cape Breton Island), crossing onto NS mainland to pass through Truro and Dartmouth, then on to Annapolis Royal on the Bay of Fundy coast before reaching Yarmouth (dinner and night at hotel).

DAY 7 – YARMOUTH / PORTLAND

After breakfast at hotel, board bus to proceed to car ferry for 11-hour voyage to Portland, ME. After landing in Portland in early evening, bus proceeds to hotel for dinner and final evening together.

DAY 8 – PORTLAND / HOME

After breakfast at hotel, board bus for transfer to airport for morning flight(s) home.

With Age Comes Civic Responsibility

The eighteenth birthday; one of those huge landmarks that loom in the distance of your childhood, one of those birthdays that promise privileges of adulthood. The first time one is able to purchase a personal credit card, order items off of television infomercials, make a contribution to tobacco company profits and be seen by others as a technical adult.
