GERMANY: PHILIPP CHRISTOPH VOGLER'S GERMAN ANCESTORS By Dr. Frederick W. Vogler

FOURTH INSTALLMENT (CONCLUSION)

For the Gondelsheim Voglers, apart from the succession of their births, baptisms, marriages, and deaths as recorded there over a span of nearly fifty years before Hans Georg's and Philipp Christoph's departure for North America, what must their lives have been like over that first half-century? Oddly enough, even though Philipp Christoph's own 1790 "Memoir" (official Moravian obituary) describes him as having been trained as a boy to be a tailor, there is no mention of him or any of his relatives in contemporary lists of Gondelsheim craftsmen or tradesmen, although his father Hans Georg is described as a "field and woods hunter" in the 1736 Maulbronn parish register entry of his second marriage to Anna Maria Klingsin. Up until recently, we had assumed that the family had simply been unable to find acceptance as full members of Gondelsheim society, being considered second-class citizens of Swiss rather than local origin, and that growing exasperation arising from that situation had prompted Hans Georg to depart for North America at the age of 44, along with his eldest child Philipp Christoph, then 19. However, in 2002 our German friend and research helper Werner Kaag sent us a set of 76 photocopied pages from various Gondelsheim town records, on each of which Hans Georg's name appears in an unfavorable context as part of a local group being watched as disloyal and potentially dangerous. According to this information, over a period of 15 years beginning in 1727 and ending with his emigration in 1742, Hans Georg Vogler had been systematically monitored by town authorities as one of a group of seditious troublemakers (sometimes referred to as "rebels") who refused to accept the authority of the local feudal overlord but instead supported his rival in claiming jurisdiction there in Gondelsheim.

Toward the end of that period, a bizarre Pied Piper figure came into Hans Georg's life in the person of one Sebastian Zuberbuehler, an energetic, fast-moving, glib-talking man from Canton Appenzell in northern Switzerland who by the early 1740s had become an expatriate based in New England, working as the principal recruiting agent of Colonel Samuel Waldo, a prominent Massachusetts entrepreneur and land speculator with close ties to the British colonial governor of Massachusetts. About that time, Waldo had convinced the colonial authorities of the desirability of creating a buffer zone of settlements along the underpopulated Maine coast between Massachusetts and French Canada. With official approval, Waldo devised a plan for creating such a buffer through the convenient use of German Protestants to be recruited in Europe for resettlement on land belonging to him in Maine, still a part of Massachusetts at the time and to remain so until 1820. Although the most important purpose of this German enclave project was actually to protect the English colonists to the south from the hostile French and their Indian allies, it remained a "hidden agenda" matter until after Zuberbuehler's German recruits had agreed to what was to be a thoroughly unpleasant and dangerous cat's paw function for them for nearly 20 years, ending only with the surrender of Canada to the British at the end of the French and Indian War. At any rate, Waldo had a speciously attractive prospectus prepared and printed in 1741 for distribution in southwest Germany, inviting "Palatines and Germans" to emigrate to New England for resettlement at Broad Bay under what appeared to be highly generous terms guaranteed by Waldo himself.

During the winter of 1741-42, after this invitation had been widely circulated in its target area,

As we continue to further our research on the Vogler family, it is our desire to inspire each of you to further your own immediate family genealogy. Waldo's agent Zuberbuehler traveled about southwestern Germany actively soliciting applications for emigration. His efforts were successful, for by late winter some 200 persons from the Palatinate and from Wuerttemberg had committed themselves, among them Hans Georg Vogler and his son Philipp Christoph. In March 1742, this father-son team left Gondelsheim to join the others on their way across western Europe to the Dutch port of Rotterdam, where they were to board a ship for North America. Since no other family members accompanied them, they appear to have taken leave forever of Philipp Christoph's remaining adolescent siblings as well as his step-mother Anna Maria and his 4-year-old half-sister Maria Margaretha. Early in 2001, we unexpectedly came in contact with Suzanne Hiller Bullock of Mechanicsville, Virginia, who informed us that she is a direct descendant of Philipp Christoph's younger sister Maria Catharina Vogler, born in 1724 and married in 1752 in Heidelsheim, a town about three miles north of Gondelsheim, where she and her descendants lived until Suzanne's Hiller grandparents emigrated to the United States not long before World War II, with many other close relatives still living today in Heidelsheim and in or near Karlsruhe some 15 miles to the southeast.

After assembling in the Palatinate town of Mannheim on the Rhine, Zuberbuehler's group proceeded to travel slowly in small boats down the Rhine toward Holland, with an unexpected and surely unwelcome delay of some eight weeks at Cologne while transatlantic travel arrangements were being frantically worked out by Zuberbuehler in Rotterdam and in England. Finally, in August the group was able to embark at Rotterdam for New England aboard the English ship Lydia. After a brief call at the Channel port of Deal in England, the ship sailed westward into the Atlantic on August 18, 1742, carrying our ancestors Hans Georg and Philipp Christoph off to a new life in North America. Europe was now behind them, and they would never return.

As far as we have been able to determine, these pioneer forefathers never looked back, choosing instead to devote their energies to the rigorous task of establishing a new, more gratifying life for themselves and the next generation. And for more than two centuries thereafter their American and Canadian descendants seem to have shown no interest in recalling their European roots. The memory of Switzerland vanished altogether, and of the family's German home in Gondelsheim only what was soon to be a long-misleading obsolete place-name spelling remained to identify Philipp Christoph's birthplace somewhere in the Palatinate.







Known Deaths in The Family

Dr. Elizabeth "Betty" Moore Bullard of 1705 Skylyn Drive died on Monday, February 25, 2008 at the Spartanburg Hospital for Restorative Care. Born in Winston-Salem, NC June 6, 1930, she was the daughter of Hoke Vogler Bullard and May E. Moore Bullard, granddaughter of the Rev. and Mrs. John W. Moore. She lived in High Point, NC as a child, moving with the family to Charlotte at age 10. She attended Charlotte public schools and finished Central High School in 1948. She completed a degree in psychology at the Woman's College of the University of NC (now UNC-G), earned an M.Ed. from UNC-Chapel Hill, and her doctorate in education from Duke University. She taught history at Lexington and Asheville high schools and became a curriculum specialist and then director of international education for the NC Department of Public Instruction. In Raleigh she had her own public TV program on world cultures. After five years as director of education for the Asia Society in New York, she joined the faculty of the University of SC as Graduate Professor of Education, retiring in 1998.

In 1978 President Jimmy Carter appointed Betty to the President's Commission on Foreign Language and International Studies. Later she was chief consultant to Walter Cronkite's "Why in the World?" television series,
Her honors include North Carolina's Outstanding Educator award, national awards for excellence in writing, and the East-West Center's

national awards for excellence in writing, and the East-West Center Distinguished Service Award for promoting mutual understanding between the US and Asia. In 1995 UNC-G designated her Outstanding Alumna of the Year.

She is survived by two brethers: Hoke Vogler Bullard,
Jr. MD (Mary Jane Schumacher), of Wilson NC, and John Moore
Bullard Ph.D., of Spartanburg, SQ. Also nephews Graham Wesley
Bullard MD (Pam Stoner), of Lake Norman NC, and Hoke V. Bullard
III (Brigitte Castonguay), of Chatham, NJ. Two nieces survive
her: Margaret Hayden Bullard of Charlotte and Mary Jane Bullard
Ellis (Jeff) of Raleigh. Five grand-nephews and two grand-nieces
complete the family.

Graveside services in Charlotte will be conducted by her Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Luther Rickenbaker, on Thursday, February 28, 2:00 PM at the Bullard family plot in the Evergreen Cemetery on Central Avenue, between Eastway Drive and Sharon-Amity Road. In lieu of flowers, memorials may be sent to Central United Methodist Church, 233 N. Church Street, Spartanburg, SC 29306.

Tony Dale Shelton, of Mt. Airy, NC, died March 12, 2008. He was the son of Jacqueline Vogler Shelton and the late John Quincy Shelton Jr. of Mt. Airy, NC. 
