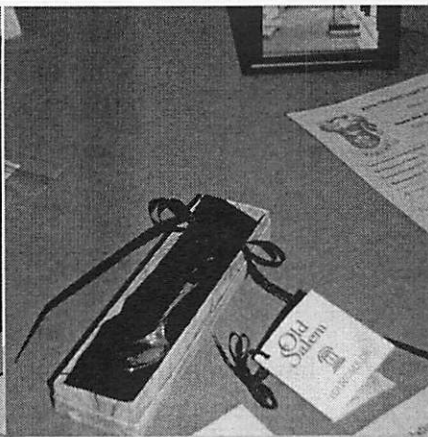
He was born at Gundelsheim, in the Palatinate (modern Gundelsheim/Baden), April 7, 1725, (actually April 2, 1723, acc. to Gundelsheim Lutheran parish birth record), and was brought up in the Lutheran faith, by his parents. Along with farming he learned the trade of a tailor.

In his seventeenth (actually nineteenth) year, AD 1742, he moved with his father to America, in the New England district, and then to Broadbay. During the Indian War he was on Cape Breton, where he served as a soldier for three or four year; and there he married his first wife, Catharina Seitz, being then in his twenty-first (actually twenty-third) year. Their marriage was blessed with six sons and four daughters, of whom one son and one daughter preceded him out of time.

In 1761, there was an awakening in his neighborhood, and he became concerned about his salvation. His youthful years had been spent in ignorance, and in school he had not gone far enough to learn to read, so now he. . . .to read more, please visit our web site at www.voglerfoundation.org

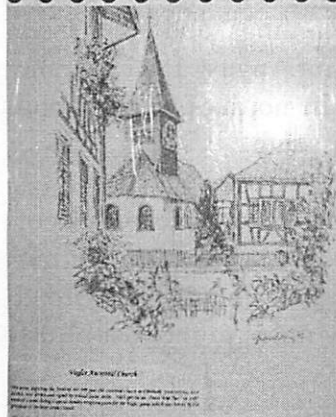
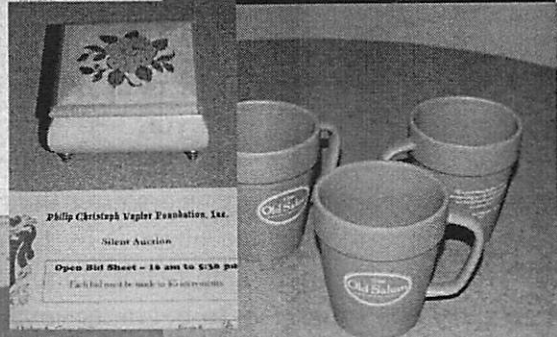


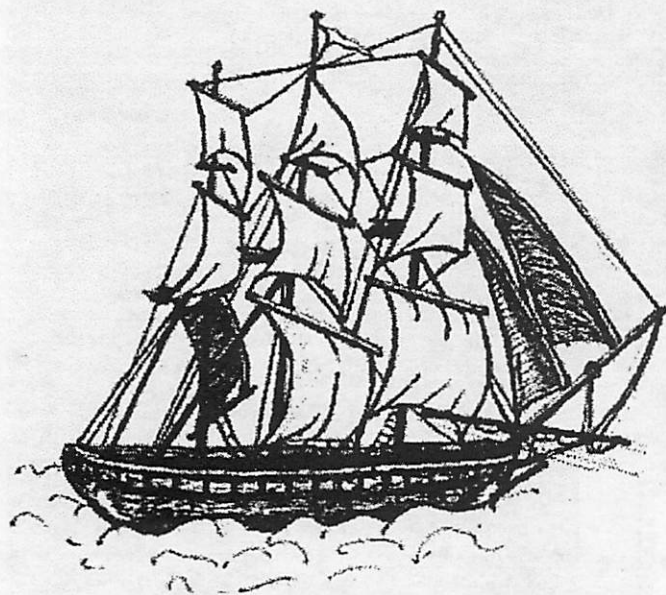
Silent Auction Donators & Winners

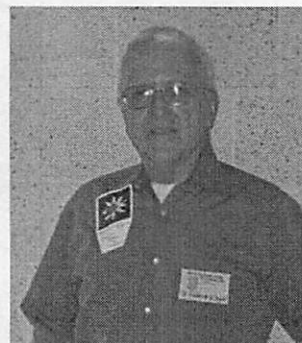

**THE GOOD SHIP LYDIA:
OUR PIONEER ANCESTORS' 1742
TRANSATLANTIC VOYAGE
TO THE NEW WORLD**

What must it have been like for our Vogler pioneer ancestors when they decided to leave their native town of Gundelsheim (now Gondelsheim/Baden) in southwestern Germany and venture across the North Atlantic in search of a new and better life in what is now Maine (then part of Massachusetts

until 1820)? Unlike the old Cunard Line slogan, "Getting there is half the fun!," for simple, unsophisticated people like 44-year-old Hans Georg Vogler and his 19-year-old eldest son Philipp Christoph Vogler, who presumably had never strayed far from Gundelsheim up to that point, the idea of sailing across the storm-tossed ocean must have been an alarming prospect indeed. Luckily for us, we have access to solid information about that particular voyage and its circumstances thanks to Professor Jasper J. Stahl's classic 2-volume History of Old Broad Bay and Waldoboro, first published in 1956 and reprinted in 1975. The following is primarily but not exclusively my brief summary of his account found in Vol. I, Ch. VII ("The Germans Reach Broad Bay").

The start of their journey was certainly not auspicious. Having accepted the offer of free land and passage to America, in the spring of 1742 Hans Georg and Philipp Christoph said farewell to the rest of their Gondelsheim family and proceeded to join other "Palatine Germans" in sailing down the nearby Rhine River in small boats, held up for several days halfway along by a customs delay near Cologne, and finally reaching Rotterdam in Holland on June 24. There a much longer and more alarming delay occurred, for up to that point their "Pied Piper" resettlement recruiter, General Waldo's European agent Sebastian Zuberbuehler, had been unable to make arrangements for the transatlantic crossing itself, as his frantic correspondence reveals during that time. Finally, however, he managed to locate and charter an available British ship named the Lydia under the command of Captain James Abercrombie. At last the emigrant group was able to leave Rotterdam in early August, sailing first to the English port of Deal on the Straits of Dover. While pausing there for four days, Zuberbuehler wrote to his employer Waldo that the Lydia had approximately 200 passengers on board, of whom around 140 were full-paid passengers and the rest having been allowed to sign promissory notes agreeing to pay Zuberbuehler the cost of their passage within five years after their arrival in Maine. Here we have specific information as to the amount of debt incurred for that purpose by Hans Georg and Philipp Christoph: 6 pounds, 10 shillings, and ninepence, obviously a far more significant amount at that time than it would be now. So at last on August 18, 1742, the Lydia sailed from Deal to begin its voyage to the New World, embarking on a route to the north of England and Scotland, probably to lessen the risk of attack by enemy French or Spanish ships further south.

Although there is no record of day-by-day activities on board the Lydia during the six or seven weeks of its crossing, something did happen of great importance to our family during that time. For it was then that our Vogler pioneer ancestors first met the Seitz family as fellow passengers also on their way to a new life in Broad Bay. Even though that other family came from Oetisheim in Wuerttemberg, just a few miles to the east of the

Genealogical research and education is one goal of the PCV Foundation. Since the publication of *Descendants of Philipp Christoph Vogler*, more family history has been uncovered. As we continue to further our research on the Vogler family, it is our desire to inspire each of you to further your own immediate family genealogy. For future generations, it is important that you document your own family history.

Voglers' own town of Gondelsheim in what was then the Palatinate, there had been no known contact between the two families before their voyage together to America in the late summer and fall of 1742. The emigrating Seitz family consisted of Lorentz Seitz, his wife Anna Margaretha, and their young children, of whom the eldest was their daughter Anna Catharina. It was she who would later marry Philipp Christoph in 1746 at the French fortress of Louisbourg on Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, after the siege and capture of that "Gibraltar of North America" by the British with the help of German settlers and others from Maine who had been brought there by the Royal Navy for that purpose.

Had there been a shipboard romance between those two young people during the Lydia's 1742 crossing? Very, very unlikely indeed! For although Philipp Christoph was nineteen years old at the time, Anna Catharina was not yet ten (born November 28, 1732) when the two families arrived in Maine, a fact not mentioned in Prof. Stahl's book but reported to us recently by our German friend and family history research helper Werner Kaag. It was he who traced the Seitz family back seven generations from Anna Catharina's while confirming what we already knew about Philipp Christoph's Swiss-German family background for five generations back from his own.

At last the Lydia finally reached the coast of Massachusetts and anchored for a few days at Marblehead north of Boston. There it took on additional passengers for the same planned settlement in Maine and then continued on its way to the northeast, this time escorted not only by Zuberbuehler but by General Waldo himself as their patron. By this time, it was already late October when the ship reached the mouth of the Medomak River about 60 miles northeast of Portland and slowly made its way upstream to what was to become Broad Bay.

What the new settlers discovered upon their arrival must have been an appalling surprise for them. Contrary to what they had been told they could expect, there was no established town as such, no town hall, no church building, not even proper houses of the sort they were used to in Germany. Instead, they found only primeval forest and a scattering of a few small, crude log cabins far from civilization as they knew it and threatened by hostile Indians lurking in the forest, with the chill of approaching winter already upon that scene.

But their decision to leave their European homes to come to this unexpectedly forbidding place had been taken with no looking back for any of them. They and those other Germans who arrived there in the next few years did meet the challenge and, despite all odds, succeeded in creating a thriving, permanent new town that later in that century would become the one we know today as Waldoboro.

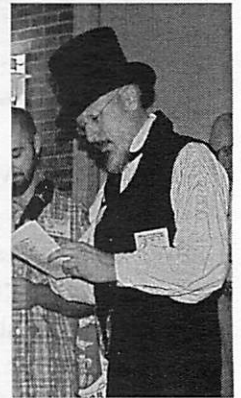

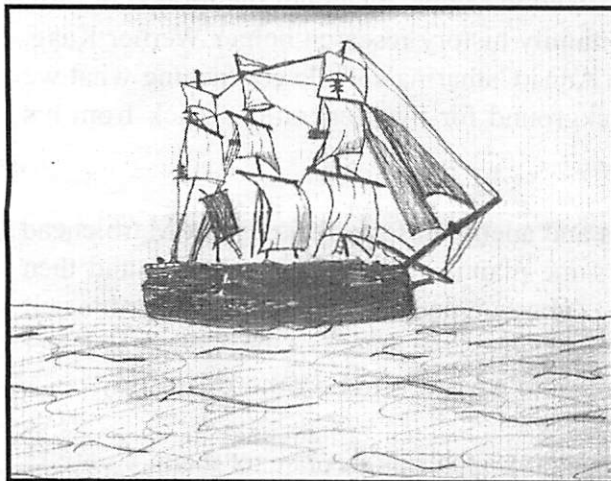

Reunion Artists July 18, 2008

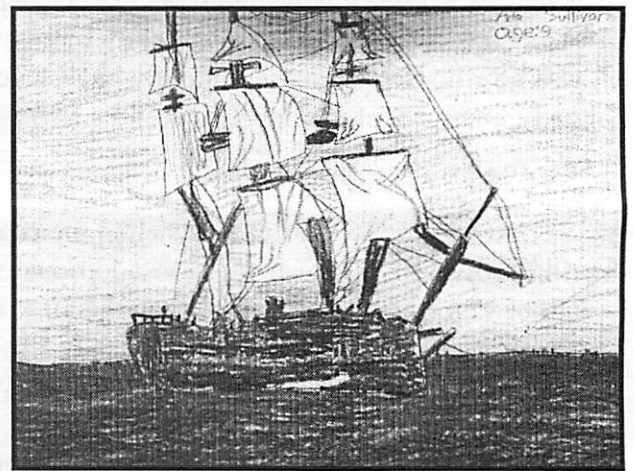

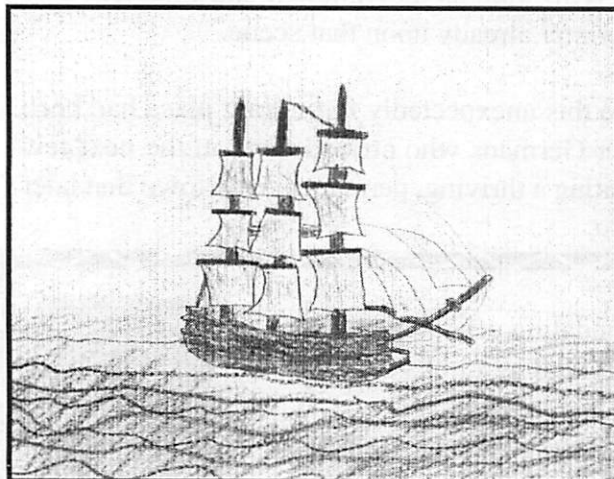
